Please describe the objectives of a veterinarian meeting this shortage situation as well as being located in the community, area, state/insular area, or position requested above (limit your response to 200 words or less).

According to the USDA Census, Arkansas is one of the leading states in animal agricultural production. The Central region of Arkansas produced approximately 289,000 food animals in 2010. Conway, Perry, Van Buren, and Yell counties are in this region and produced approximately 167,000 food animals in 2010. According to the Arkansas Veterinary Medical Board, there are 3 Veterinarians who offer food animal services in these counties; however, food animal medicine is significantly less than 50% of their practices. The Veterinarian in Van Buren County requested that this area be included in the VMLRP to facilitate the hiring of a Veterinarian and expand food animal services at his practice.

Implementation of the VMLRP in this region is vital to the success of food animal production, the protection of public health, and maintaining economic stability in this area. A minimum 30 percent-time (12 hr/wk, based on a 40 hr/wk FTE) commitment will be required of the successful applicant, with preference given to applicants who exceed this requirement. The objectives for a Veterinarian meeting this shortage situation include providing food animal Veterinary services, recruitment of new Veterinary graduates to practice food animal medicine, and establishing an additional food animal Veterinarian in this region.

Please describe the activities of a veterinarian meeting this shortage situation and being located in the community, area, state/insular area, or position requested above (limit your response to 200 words or less).

The activities of a Veterinarian meeting this shortage situation will include providing food animal Veterinary services to Conway, Perry, Van Buren, and Yell counties at a minimum. These activities will include basic herd health maintenance (i.e. vaccinations, deworming, production medicine, etc...), farm visits in response to sick or diseased food animals, Veterinary surgical and medical treatment as needed, Veterinary consultation, providing Veterinary oversight in the use of pharmaceuticals in food animals, issuing health certificates, developing a clientele to enable the Food Animal Veterinary Practice to thrive in this area over the long term, and providing Veterinary support to the surrounding community that will improve the protection of animal health and public health through the practice of modern, scientifically sound Veterinary Medicine.

A Veterinarian performing the services listed above, in addition to other Veterinary medical services for food animals, will greatly enhance Arkansas' food animal production and improve the health of the animals in this geographic location. The improved food animal health will result in increased food safety, improved public health, and economic growth for producers in this area.

Please describe any past efforts to recruit and retain a veterinarian in the shortage situation identified above (limit your response to 100 words or less).

There are currently no recruitment or retention efforts specifically for this shortage area. However, the state of Arkansas has 12 contract slots with Veterinary Colleges in order to facilitate the education of Arkansas Veterinarians. In addition, there is a proposed bill in the 2011 legislative session that would create a Veterinary Loan Repayment Program for Arkansas residents who graduate from Mississippi State University College of Veterinary Medicine and practice food animal medicine in Arkansas for 5 years. There is a second proposed bill that would create a study to address the shortage of Large Animal Veterinarians in Arkansas.

Please describe the risk of this veterinarian position not being secured or retained. Include the risk(s) to the production of a safe and wholesome food supply and to animal, human, and environmental health not only in the community but in the region, state/insular area, nation, and/or international community (limit your response to 250 words or less).

According to the Arkansas Veterinary Medical Board, the number of Veterinarians in private practice dedicated primarily to food animal medicine has decreased over the past 10 years. There were 20 Veterinarians dedicated to providing food animal Veterinary services in 2001. In 2010 there were approximately 9 private practice Veterinarians in the state of Arkansas dedicated primarily to food animal medicine. This disturbing trend will continue unless an incentive is provided for Veterinarians to practice food animal medicine in Arkansas. This incentive must be significant enough to offset the financial advantages associated with alternative areas of Veterinary Medicine.

While the number of practicing food animal Veterinarians has decreased across the state, the amount of food animal production in Conway, Perry, Van Buren, and Yell counties combined increased by approximately 6,700 head in 2010. The production statistics for 2010 equate to approximately 55,600 food animals per practicing Veterinarian. However, as previously mentioned, the food animal portion of the current Veterinary practices in this area is significantly less than 50%. The increase in production and lack of Veterinary services in this region presents a significant and increasing gap in the protection of animal health and human health in this region. If this VMLRP nomination is not secured, the gap in this need area will continue to grow, which will increase the risk to animal health, public health, environmental health, economic stability, and the production of a safe and wholesome food supply in Central Arkansas.
