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

Small Business Innovation Research and Small Business Technology Transfer Programs Overview

Purpose and Priorities

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SBIR/STTR is intended to support **scientific excellence and technological innovation** through the investment of Federal research funds to build a strong national economy by stimulating technological innovation in the private sector

- Strengthen the role of small business in meeting Federal research and development needs
- Increase the commercial application of Federally supported research results
- Foster and encourage participation by historically underserved and women-owned small businesses
- STTR objective: stimulate formal cooperative partnerships of ideas and technologies between small businesses and nonprofit research institutions (e.g., Universities, Federal Laboratories)

Applicant Eligibility

RFA Page # 31-32

• Each applicant must qualify as a small business concern (SBC) through registration with the SBA for R/R&D purposes at the time of selection



For-profit company operating in the U.S. + Research performed in the U.S.



More than 50% owned and controlled by U.S. citizen(s) or permanent resident(s)



No more than 500 employees (including affiliates)

Application Details (Project Summary)

RFA Page # 38, 39

- Must be 250 words or less
- 12-point Times New Roman font
- The Project Summary must show how the project goals align with the project goals of the SBIR/STTR Phase I Program
- Project Summary should not contain proprietary information
- Template available:

Application Details (Project Narrative)

RFA Page # 39

- Project Narrative (PN): 17-page limit and will be strictly enforced.
 - ⁻ 1.5 line spacing and at least 1-inch margins
 - ⁻ 12-point Times New Roman font
 - Includes text, figures and tables
 - Tables and figures: no smaller than 11-point Times New Roman
 - Tables may be single spaced
- Applications exceeding the page limits will be returned without review
- Resubmission: The response to previous review must not exceed 1 page. This does not count towards the 17-page limit for the PN.

Application Details (Project Narrative Items)

RFA Page # 39-40

Project Narrative must include:

- a. Response to Previous Review for Resubmissions
- b. Responsiveness to USDA SBIR/STTR Program Priorities
- c. Identification and Significance of the Problem or Opportunity
- d. Background and Rationale
- e. Relationship with Research or Research and Development
- f. Technical Objectives
- g. Work Plan
- h. Related Research or Research and Development
- i. The Market Opportunity

Application Submission

• NIFA only accepts electronic submission of applications.

- NIFA Grants Application Guide available: <u>nifa.usda.gov/resource/nifa-grantsgov-application-guide</u>
- Application documents must be in Portable Document Format (PDF) to be accepted by NIFA, including your narrative and budget justifications.
 - Grants.gov may allow other formats, but NIFA does <u>not</u>
 - Do not use third-party PDF builders

Application Submission Check

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Key Application Instructions

All references are to the NIFA Grants Application Guide

- Attachments must be in a portable document format (PDF) format
- Check the manifest of submitted files to verify attachments are in the correct format
- Follow the submission instructions
- Provide an accurate email address, where designated, on the SF-424 R&R
- Contact the <u>Grants.gov helpdesk</u> for technical support and keep a record of the correspondence
- Contact NIFA if applicant does not receive correspondence from NIFA regarding an application within 30 days of the application deadline



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Proposal Evaluation Process

Initial Screening Criteria

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- The proposing firm must qualify as a small business concern
- The application must meet content and format requirements
 - Summary/Abstract exceeds 250 words and/or is not in PDF format
 - Project Narrative exceeds 17 pages of written text and/or is not in PDF format
- The proposed budget must be within the dollar ceiling identified in the RFA
 - Budget exceeds the ceiling of \$131,500 or \$181,500, including TABA
- The proposed project must fall within one of the USDA SBIR/STTR topic areas
 - o Projects seeking funding solely for product development where no research is involved will be excluded
- An application must contain adequate scientific/technical and market opportunity information that clearly states the project plan and objectives

Contact NIFA if applicant does not receive correspondence from NIFA regarding an application within 30 days of the application deadline.

- 1. Phase I Scientific and Technical Feasibility
- Market Potential
- 3. Importance of the Problem
- 4. Investigator and Resource Qualifications
- 5. Budget
- 6. Duplication

Evaluation Process

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
Proposals are assigned for review to at least 3 technical reviewers with expertise in the proposed topic.

Reviewers will produce individual reviews of each proposal, evaluating the strengths and weaknesses.

These written
reviews are used to
begin panel
discussions with
other reviewers
serving on the peerreview panel.

Through these discussions, peer-review panelists come to consensus on the final rating and ranking of proposals.

Timeline of Competitive Programs



On average, a competitive program takes approximately <u>6 months</u> from the proposal due date to final selection We will keep you updated as much as possible. We appreciate your patience!




